


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DEMI LOVATO

'REVAMPED'

Since the release of her eighth studio album, Holy Fvck, primarily influenced by pop-punk and hard rock, Demi Lovato has enjoyed somewhat of a change in image. It shouldn't be surprising to devoted fans since she famously held a "funeral for [her] pop music" in a photo posted on social media at the beginning of 2022. But once it came time to reimagine her existing pop songs to coincide with the performance of new punk-rock stylings from her last LP, she needed to find a way to make them all work together on tour.

That process ended up being more fun for Lovato than she initially envisioned, and the positive reception of the reimaginings prompted her to consider re-recording older songs from her catalogue. The result is Revamped, the singer's first remix album composed of ten new "rock versions" of some of her biggest pop hits.

Critics have already labeled Lovato's remixes as a copycat of Taylor Swift's ambitious re-recording project, even though the circumstances surrounding the two are quite different. However, the popularity of new versions of previously recorded tracks in an artist's discography has seen a vast increase in streams on music streaming services, indicating that many listeners enjoy hearing new life breathed into songs from over a decade ago.

Besides, Revamped feels less like Lovato trying to contribute to the current popularity of re-records and more like an attempt to rewrite her history, which is her right. Coming of age in the entertainment industry as a former Disney child star comes with its own set of complications without being burdened further by management and record labels pushing such an artist towards a particular sound or genre.

Indeed, her split from her toxic Disney management in light of her 2018 overdose likely caused some of her work during that reign to be difficult to return to. So instead of pretending they don't exist, Lovato has taken to re-recording some

of the songs that made her famous to reflect the challenges she's faced and overcome and the better person she became because of it. Revamped sounds just like that, an update of a catalogue she might not necessarily like anymore but still appreciates, and sometimes that's the best we can do.

Many of the songs re-recorded on Revamped had neared overplay status in their original versions, including but not limited to "Heart Attack", "Confident", and "Cool for the Summer". But here, they sound better as alt-rock songs and give listeners a better shot at believing that Lovato is feeling more confident now than ever. She further updates singles like "Neon Lights", "Give Your Heart a Break", and "Tell Me You Love Me" with continuously flawless vocals and rock production that inexplicably works. The only track that doesn't quite land as a rock song is "Sorry Not Sorry", since most pop "diss tracks" aren't meant to be translated into alt-rock stylings, no matter who's singing them.

Lovato is grateful for her Revamped remixes since they have allowed her to fall back in love with songs she had since grown tired of performing, namely "Give Your Heart a Break", which she reimagined into a duet with Bert McCraken. She described "Tell Me You Love Me", the title track from her R&B and soul-influenced sixth LP, as the most difficult to transform into a rock song.

"The vocals are just so soulful on that one, and so trying to keep it soulful while also amping it up for this record was pretty difficult," the singer told Billboard. But she seldom misses the mark during the re-recording process, likely because her current rock sound comes so naturally to her. More than just having fun updating her work, Demi Lovato refashions herself and her music to reflect the person she is today, which is bold and defiant.

THE PRETENDERS

'RELENTLESS'

hen the Pretenders were inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 2005, Chrissie Hynde ended her characteristically terse acceptance speech with "two notes—boom-boom, boom-boom: Keep moving, but never change." It's a little alarming, then, when the first line she sings on the Pretenders' new album, Relentless, is "I must be going through a metamorphosis." Never change?

The line opens a song called "Losing My Sense of Taste". According to Hynde, it's her take on the pandemic lockdown—a theme almost no one wants to hear about anymore, and despite what Hynde says about the song, you don't have to. Although "Losing My Sense of Taste" was inspired by the COVID times, it's clearly about something else: late-life loss of all sense and sensibility. Over a heavy but chugging minor-key backing track, Hynde sings of "senile dementia or some kind of psychosis / I don't even care about rock and roll." In addition to violating her induction-speech enjoinment to "never change," is she also going to stop moving and park the Pretenders for good? By the song's end, she's moved through losing her sense of taste to losing her sense of smell to—perish the thought—losing her sense of hearing: the one thing no rock and roller can live without.

The very existence of Relentless, the Pretenders' 12th studio album, proves Hynde isn't about to stop or change, no matter how fungible the personnel or sporadic the band's output over the last few decades. Currently, the band's core is Hynde and James Walbourne, who initially attracted notice as the secret weapon in the Pernice Brothers in the mid-2000s. Walbourne attached himself to the Pretenders in 2008 and is now Hynde's chief collaborator. The duo co-wrote the songs on Relentless and its predecessor, Hate for Sale (2020), and it's Walbourne's expressive lead guitar that confirms we're listening to the Pretenders and not a solo Chrissie Hynde record.


There's no question that Hynde is the Pretenders and the Pretenders are Hynde, but she has insisted for decades that there'd have been no recognizable band without founding guitarist James Honeyman-Scott, who died of a drug overdose in 1982 when he was just 25. It was

Honeyman-Scott's guitar tone and style that, in tandem with Hynde's voice—one of the most distinctive and expressive in rock history—created the band's original musical signature. Hynde knew not only how important Honeyman-Scott was to the band's identity but also how essential his role was to her traditionalist rock ideology: "One thing that never goes out of favor is a guitar hero," she recently told an interviewer. "And I make sure I always have one." ("Always" isn't quite correct, and when she hasn't, the Pretenders' music has tended to suffer as a result.)

Nearly 50 years of rock relentlessness have also earned her the right to court schmaltz. (She was already doing that 30 years ago, let's not forget, when she paid hitmakers-for-hire Tom Kelly and Billy Steinberg to write "I'll Stand by You" for her and get her back into the Top Ten.) After "Let It Go" pushes the emotionality right to the edge of tolerability, "I Think About You Daily" may topple over it (perhaps she is losing her sense of taste, after all?). Featuring a seagulls-crying-overthe-spindrift string section composed by Radiohead's Jonny Greenwood, the song dwells lengthily and heavily on Hynde's regret over how she mistreated the one she lost and now thinks about daily.

This wallowing guilt is a little surprising coming from Hynde, who has always been an avowed love-and-leave type, a solitary soul, and a believer in the impermanence of all things and experiences, including (indeed especially) romance. It might suffice to characterize the song's sentimentalized and self-pitying breakup vibe by saying that it would be fun to hear Lana Del Rey cover it (which might, in turn, suffice to acknowledge the debt women in rock continue to owe Hynde). It might also suffice to assess the song by saying that the degree to which it works for you will probably depend on how much you need Hynde to conform to the image and persona of the boxer on the cover of Relentless. Whatever you think, you can be sure it's all the same to her.

UNLOCKING THE VIBES: 'OPTIONS' BY MR. REAPER FT. WIZ KHALIFA

Now, if you've had the privilege of caressing the auditory senses with Mr.Reaper's rendition of "Higher," you've borne witness to a hurricane of self-empowerment. It's a lyrical tapestry woven with threads of resilience and audacity. ICONA POP

'CLUB ROMANTECH'

Icona Pop's 2012 song "I Love It" was such a world-beating smash that it even found its way out of dance clubs and into at least one clubhouse. A men's pro sports team used the song as the theme for their closed-door celebration after they won their league championship. (I not only have this firsthand, but it's also preserved somewhere on a voice recorder.) When you've got a room full of sweat- and testosterone-soaked ballplayers to choose your neo-teenybopper pop confection as the tune they want to bounce around to while further soaking themselves in sprays of shaken bubbly, that can only mean that you, too, are the champions, my friend.

For a few months in 2013, "I Love It" seemed to be everywhere in the US, from The Vampire Diaries to Good Morning America and from Girls to Glee. No doubt the song's ubiquity owed at least partly to the general tendency of anything that gets popular in one place to spread all over (or "go viral", if you must, in this post-Covid world) just because it's the readiest thing to hand—a tendency the social media age has hugely increased.

It's not only that, though. "I Love It" is much more interesting than the usual dance track pablum. The tune has a semblance of melody and chords, and its verse is well built to spring load the infectious chorus. Lyrically, before the insouciant rah-rah of the refrain, we get this verse: "I crashed my car into the bridge / I watched, I let it burn / I threw your shit into a bag and pushed it down the stairs." There's also a bridge (in the compositional sense) in which the singer half taunts, half boasts, "You're from the '70s, but I'm a '90s bitch," making it clear that this

is a song about a younger woman dumping her significantly older (in)significant other and, for good measure, scorching the earth, or at least her car..

Flash forward ten (!) years, and Icona Pop are finally back with their second record, Club Romantech. To kill a decade of suspense, no, there's nothing here on the order of "I Love It", which may or may not have to do with Charli XCX having written none of the new release's 15 songs.

Nonetheless, this music is quite successful at doing what it's designed to do: fan out into clubs, teenagers' playlists, and Urban Outfitters franchises and reach the nearest available pleasure receptors of young listeners. These are essentially interchangeable dance tracks, nearly all around the same length and tempo, and written mainly by the same consortium around the same repeating keywords (feel, heart, body, dancing, tonight, etc.).

The last song on Club Romantech is also the longest, clocking in at a whopping 3:19. It's called "Spa", a word Icona Pop draw out—"spa-ah"—so it rhymes with "sauna", which is pretty funny. They're done dancing their hearts out tonight and are ready to go to this spa, where the song's opening couplet, "Naked bodies everywhere / I'm OK, you can stare," sounds a good deal less NSFW than it would if the setting was still the club—except, wait a second, "Spa" is deceptively but unmistakably extremely NSFW, if you pay a little attention. The naughtiness starts in the line after the one about naked bodies: "You and me forever young, with this facial made of"—and then there's a very conspicuous absence where a word is called for to rhyme with "young",

until a sampled (male) voice circles in to supply a big "0". [Beavis and Butthead laugh.] A real male voice-the only one on Club Romantech, and a charmingly fey one at that-soon chimes in with a little godfearing spa S&M: "Slap my body with a birch / In the morning, we go to church." Presumably, this voice belongs to Tucker Halpern, one half of the duo Sofi Tukker, who co-wrote "Spa" with Icona Pop and producer Jon Hume. Sofi Tukker are so called because the duo's other half is named Sophie Hawley-Weld. Halpern and Hawley-Weld met in college, where Halpern was the captain of the men's basketball team (!) before the Epstein-Barr virus forced him to quit and follow the usual transition from Ivy League All-Star sportsman to purveyor of electropop. The college they met at was Brown University, which explains why "Spa" is by far the cleverest and most exciting song on Club Romantech because everyone knows that all the smartest and most interesting people go to Brown.

Does "Spa" fit with the rest of the tunes on this album? No. Is it going to become a worldwide hit for Icona Pop? Unlikely. Will it be heard thumping in the background of a clubhouse celebration after a sports team wins its league championship? That prospect is marvelous to contemplate, but no, certainly not. I don't care. I love it.

DOJA CAT 'SCARLET'



Just shy of a decade ago, Amala Ratna Zandile Dlamini, otherwise known as Doja Cat, crept onto the TikTok scene with 'So High', which led to subsequent interest from Kemosabe and RCA Records. 'Say So' was also the beneficiary of TikTok virality, escalated to success by viral dance challenges, becoming a 'sleeper hit' for the artist.

To get a sense of Doja Cat's ascent, her videos on YouTube alone have amassed over 7 billion views to date. In a monochromatic world, bloodied and ominous, Doja Cat plucks out her own eyeball and gently flicks it across the desk.

It drops into another fantasy realm; this time she's poised, towering atop the head of an illustrated pistachio green devil. 'Paint the Town Red' ensues; it's unfalteringly infectious sample of 'Walk on By' by Dionne Warwick gracefully revolves through a dystopian dreamscape.

Controversy, extravagance and viral success are ultimately synonymous with the LA singer-songwriter. Doja Cat's fourth studio album 'Scarlet' is no exception to this unspoken rule. The run-up to its release date has stirred a cacophony of chatter online, perhaps most notably for the arsenal of comments steered towards

'Scarlet's dark and demonic iconography. "Has she sold her soul to the devil?", the line emblazoned underneath the video to second track 'Demons', as Doja Cat skulks around in flickering shadows, glossed head to toe in black prosthetics and ruby eyes that flash in the darkness.

The animalistic figure crawls across the ceiling – perhaps as a nod to The Exorcist – above actress Christina Ricci's bed whilst she sleeps. The morbid visual direction certainly delivers on the record's hype. Though sadly, this vitality and penchant for the macabre doesn't translate to the record's sound.

The infamous bathtub scene in The Shining morphs into a gnarled, disturbing hand appearing from the suds in Nightmare on Elm Street; it carries allusions to static TVs courtesy of The Poltergeist and found footage in true Blair Witch Project essence.

Embracing and relishing horror movie tropes – the gothic and the gore – it's a polished transformation for Doja, though these prevailing themes stumble in consistency throughout the record, at odds with the reinedin sound design Doja Cat is exploring on this record. Overall, this is a sonically and thematically more mature

offering from Doja; track feels fuller and more adventurous than her previous work. There's a healthy dose of self-mocking and self-aware lyricism which never falters to brand her sound with trademark wit and character; she nods to her notorious red carpet vaping altercation and references "selling out" in her career of her own volition.

'Fuck the Girls' offers swathes of punch and grit, channeling the laissez-faire attitude and bravado she is so closely associated with. On 'Go Off', however, there's a sharp change of pace and the record rests in a slower tempo for the remainder of the song cycle. From 'Can't Wait' to 'Balut', 'Scarlet' wallows in a daydream-like haze for one song too many and the record loses its vigour and sense of adventure.

The chilled, languorous template delivers on value, but offers little else and you can't help but feel like these are unnecessary filler tracks. At its core, 'Scarlet' is an interesting exploration into the world of ego trips, the trappings of fame, escapism and novelty, a welcome deviation with a heightened sense of maturity and finesse.

BAKAR

'HALO'



Bakar has perfected a gorgeous blend of rap, pop, R&B and synth electronics across new album 'Halo'. Described as one of the most exciting artists in Britain and praised by the likes of Elton John, Virgil Abloh and Skepta, Bakar ensures he is on the path to becoming one of the greats. 'Halo' starts with 'One In One Out', a pulsating track with an addictive guitar solo. He sings "sooner or later I'll change for the good", warming up the listener to an album focused on the loneliness and lifestyle of a musician on the road.

The pace picks up with 'Alive!' full of acoustic guitar and quick tambourine, demonstrating – as ever – that Bakar can spread himself over many genres. This song also has moments of tender vocals, but pop choruses quickly sweep these away.

One of the strongest tracks on 'Halo', 'Alive!' has a contagious warmth, making it the perfect choice for the first single release. 'Facts Situation' is a slower, calmer part of the album, pausing pop and rap.

Singing "I hate the facts; I hate the situation" it's a song of slow frustration and acceptance. It features Mark Crown on trumpet and a spoken outro by Mona Tougaard. 'Halo' is mostly an upbeat album, but it paces itself by taking breaks with more reflective tracks like this song. The pace accelerates again with 'All Night' full of reverb guitars and emotion.

It may not catch Bakar at his optimistic, but the upbeat drums keep the album high. It has moments of isolated vocals sighing in chorus, showing the never-ending depth of Bakar's music. 'All Night' focuses on the complexities of affection and infatuation.

'Selling Biscuits' is another breath from the upbeat R&B-meets-pop blend, acting as the interlude with softly sung lyrics saying: "Selling biscuits to all the rich kids, same old habits because we're all misfits..." With minimal instrumentation, it focuses most on Bakar's lyricism across the whole album. It gives a moment to show the more emotional side of the album with little instrumental distraction.

'Hate The Sun' is another slower, more mellow song. Bakar sings about heart-break and anger, his excoriating lyrics stating" "I hate the sun because that's the


sun that we had..." 'Hate The Sun' highlights Bakar's great lyrics and powerful vocals at the end more than any other time in 'Halo'.

Bakar experiments with trippier and distorted vocals in 'Invisible'. It is one of the more rap-focussed songs, underpinned by droning synth. The penultimate song 'Sofa' feels like a mix of all the tracks on 'Halo'. It is full of vibrato guitar, which makes it feel trippy, but it has cleaner vocals and a bigsounding, smooth pop-like chorus.

The album finishes with a mix of the hit song 'Hell N Back', featuring Summer Walker, R&B goddess and close friend of Bakar. Most of 'Halo' was sculpted on the road, a moment of pause and introspection that affords Bakar space to surge forwards creatively.


